Scripture

Philippians 2: 3-4

Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility count others more significant than yourselves. Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others.

How many times have I been told, O Christ, by well-meaning people, that is my destiny and my charge to go out into the world and do great things for you?

How many times in response have I prayed earnestly, asking that you would bring such things to pass — that you might use me mightily for the work of your kingdom? How many times have I then waited expectantly.

And waited.

And waited
for that great thing, whatever it might be,
to be made obvious?

How many times have I felt then the gradually settling weight of disillusionment, of disappointment and confusion, when no *great thing* materialized, when no life-changing opportunity suddenly arrived at my doorstep, when no such moment of call or clarity was ever manifest at all?

In the confused afterglow of those receding anticipations, I am always faced again with the unglamorous reality of my own life: of my ongoing failures simply to love well the people around me, and of my own everpresent struggle even to desire and to pursue

a path of righteousness
and obedience in my own
small daily choices and habits.
I am faced again
with the same litany of tired,
old temptations
towing their attendant shames,
and in such times I am left, O Lord,
wondering if I have somehow
missed your call completely,
and whether I might just as well abandon
the pilgrim path entirely, for I fear that you
must see me as I see myself:

unfit for any service to you, or to your people, or to the world.

So tell me, my God, where is the disconnect between that life rife with breathtaking demonstrations of your power that I am told should be the hallmark of my walk with you — where is the disconnect between those fantastic notions and reality of my actual life, which is filled with petty frustrations, mundane responsibilities, and constant reminders of my own failure to wear well the name of Christ?

Was it wrong that I should even desire to do great things for you, Jesus? Am I amiss to plead that I might be mightily used in your works?

Do I need more faith?

More righteousness?

More of your Spirit?

Or have you simply judged me unworthy of your service?

Where, O Lord, do I go from here?

A Moment of Silence

O Child of God, listen well, and be comforted. God has never judged you unfit for any service God has called you to, for it is in Christ's righteousness God has clothed you. And God's measure of greatness has never been your own. If you would pray to do great things for your God, then you must pray such prayers without regard for how they should be answered.

Pray them knowing that in God's true and holy reckoning such greatness will most often be expressed in a long practice of humble and sacrificial servanthood, and not in any pursuit promising a rise to power, position, or prestige.

God's might is most often displayed as the grace that cradles and transcends our brokenness and poverty of spirit. If you would be so broken, that the light of God's grace might be more visible within you, shining from your chipped seams and shattered fragments, then by all means make such earnest requests of him; make them with sincerity and without reservation!

But if the root of your prayer is rather some desire for a heightened prominence or sense of accomplishment and worth – either in your own eyes or in the eyes of others – then it would be better not to pray such prayers at all. Examine well your heart and motives, before asking that God's greatness be displayed in your life.

When God answers, it will not be on your terms.

For it is not you that will do any great thing for God, but God laboring in you and through you who will greatly accomplish God's own good purposes according to the workings of God's sovereignty and love.

Be liberated now from this burden of believing that anything depends upon you – and so be liberated at least to give yourself to God's

joyful service in grateful response for the grace God has lavished upon you!

You have till now been too invested in the results of your own efforts, as if those outcomes were a thing you could ever know or measure in this life!

Be invested instead, child, in simple obedience to your king, and in long faithfulness to God's call, shepherding daily those gifts and tasks and relationships God has entrusted to you, regardless of outcomes and appearances.

God will bring all things right in God's way and in God's time. All God asks is your willingness.

Your heart is in God's hands. Your ways are in God's hands. Your days are in God's hands.

Be content in the station God has appointed you to in the season, and yet be ever ready to move at the impulse of God's love.

Tend well those things that are before you, however humble they be, and God will lead you in time to other good works God has appointed for you. Whether big or small is of no matter.

God attaches no numbers to your service. It is your heart and faithfulness God appraises.

Seek not your own glory.

Seek God, and God's glory

will be seen in you, radiant in humility
and in the strength of God's might made
manifest even in your brokenness, evident
even in the smallest of services rendered unto
God or offered in God's name,
even though they be seen
by none but you and God;
your reward is secure.

Is this still your heart's desire then, to do great works for the kingdom of heaven?

It is, though I had not known before even what it meant. I ask now for grace that I might truly and humbly repent of any root of vainglory buried in my former prayers, and I pray also for grace that I might now ask aright, in purity of heart, that the good works of God would be manifest in their many outworkings in my heart and life, at all times and in all endeavors, howsoever it pleases God.

Amen. Now, child of God, avail yourself of God's Spirit, that you might go and learn to love God and love others, practicing God's mercies daily. There is no greater work appointed to you!

Alleluia! Then to this great work of learning to bear God's likeness and Go's light, I commit my life.
